- Make sure you're registered to vote at your current address
- o Check your party affiliation
- Complete the candidate filing packet
- Review I.C. 18-2318 (Electioneering)
- Review I.C. 18-7029 and 40-1910 for posting signs as well as check for city ordinances

2024 County Candidate Filing Requirements for May 21, 2024 Primary Election Filing Period – March 4 through March 15, 2024

Partisan candidates have two options to be placed on the ballot:

- (1) File declaration of candidacy and pay the filing fee or
- (2) File declaration of candidacy and nominating petitions, containing certain number of verified signatures.

Independent candidates do not have two options. An independent candidate must file the declaration and petition. Independent candidates do not pay a filing fee.Independent Candidate residency, age and disclosure requirements for county offices are the same as the requirements for partisan candidates. Independent candidates will only be on the November ballot.

The required declaration and petitions/filing fee must be filed with the County Clerk between 8:00 a.m. on March 4 and 5:00 p.m. on March 15, 2024. Declaration of Candidacy and Petition forms can be obtained from Kristina Glascock, Twin Falls County Clerk, 630 Addison Avenue W, P.O. WHERE TO BEGIN

Treasurer Appointment & Reporting



Once a candidate has raised or spent \$500, a candidate must create a campaign finance account and

begin reporting the campaign finances, including the sources and expenses for the first \$500.

The Declaration of Candidacy filed to run for office designates the candidate as the default political treasurer, for those who have not met the \$500 threshold, until an alternate is appointed.

FILING DEADLINES

10 TH of each month in the year of the election

Annual report due lanuary 10th

Annual report due January 10th following non-election years

\$50 FINE each day after 48 hours late

Oisclosures



All campaign material (signs, flyers, mailings, TV ads, etc.) require a disclosure statement.

For example: "Paid for by [candidate's name]."

REPORTING BASICS

All money raised or spent in relation to a campaign must be accounted for and tracked. This includes the use of the candidate's personal money.

Where to Report

All candidates for all offices now report online via the Secretary of State's Campaign Finance Portal. The portal may be found at:



sunshine.voteidaho.gov

For local officials, all assistance, oversight and enforcement will be done by the County Clerk of the home county for the city, school or local district.



Remember: no one was ever fined for over-reporting

Ø Donation Limits

Maximum contribution is \$1,000 per individual, business* or political committee per election. Any single contribution of \$1,000 must be reported within **48 hours** of receipt.

*Businesses sharing controlling ownership may only contribute \$1,000 combined.



Use this form to declare your intent to be a write-in candidate for county office in Idaho.

Filing Dates and Deadlines

You must submit your complete declaration by 5:00 pm (local time) on the candidate filing deadline. (§34-704, Idaho Code)

All deadlines are at 5:00 pm (local time).

Candidate Filing Deadlines:

Primary Election: March 22, 2024 **General Election:** September 6, 2024

Filing Options

<u>Partisan Write-In Candidates</u> must submit a declaration of intent by the Primary Election filing deadline.

In addition, partisan write-in candidates must receive <u>at least five (5) write-in votes at the Primary Election</u> in order to become a candidate of a political party at the General Election.

<u>Independent Write-In Candidates</u> must submit a declaration of intent by the General Election filing deadline.

Completing the Declaration of Intent

When completing the Declaration of Intent, be sure to complete all fields and questions. Any incomplete or missing information may void your filing.

Section 1: Office Information

Enter one of the following county offices:

- Assessor
- Clerk
- · Commissioner (include District)
- Coroner
- Prosecuting Attorney
- Sheriff
- Treasurer

Section 2: Political Party

Partisan candidates:

You must be a registered member of the political party you are running for. Check your voter registration at <u>voteidaho.gov</u>.

Independent candidates:

Select the "Independent candidate" checkbox.

Section 3: Candidate Information

When entering your Ballot Name, the following will <u>NOT</u> be allowed on the ballot:

- Nicknames that promote a particular political platform or are deemed offensive.
- Professional or military identifiers such as Dr., M.D., PhD., Esq., CPA, Captain, General, etc.

A phone number is required and will become publicly available upon request.

Section 4: Residential Address

- This <u>MUST</u> be a physical address. P.O. Boxes will not be accepted.
- If your residential address is the same as your mailing address, check the box at the bottom of this section.

Section 6: Homeowner's Exemption

If you or your spouse have claimed a Homeowner's exemption, list the address in this section.

Section 7: Campaign Finance

If your campaign finance contributions or expenditures exceed \$500, you **MUST** create a campaign finance account with the Idaho Secretary of State.

Office Requirements

All county office requirements are listed below. Some offices have additional requirements, so make sure to review the requirements carefully. (§34-617 through §34-625A, Idaho Code)

Requirements for all county offices

- · 21 years of age
- United States Citizen
- Reside within the county for 1 year by the date of the election

Additional requirements

County Commissioner

- Must reside within the district for 90 days by the date of the election
- Any petition signatures must be within the commissioner district

County Prosecuting Attorney

- Residence within the county must be at least 30 days by the date of the election
- Must be licensed to practice law within the State of Idaho

TITLE 18
CRIMES AND PUNISHMENTS
CHAPTER 23
ELECTIONS

18-2318. ELECTIONEERING AT POLLS. (1) On the day of any primary, general or special election, no person may, within a polling place, or any building in which an election is being held, or within one hundred (100) feet thereof:

- (a) Do any electioneering;
- (b) Circulate cards or handbills of any kind;
- (c) Solicit signatures to any kind of petition; or
- (d) Engage in any practice which interferes with the freedom of voters to exercise their franchise or disrupts the administration of the polling place.
- (2) No person may obstruct the doors or entries to a building in which a polling place is located or prevent free access to and from any polling place.
- (3) Any election officer, sheriff, constable or other peace officer is hereby authorized, and it is hereby made the duty of such officer, to arrest any person violating the provisions of subsections (1) and (2) of this section, and such offender shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

TITLE 18
CRIMES AND PUNISHMENTS
CHAPTER 70

TRESPASS AND MALICIOUS INJURIES TO PROPERTY

PLACING POSTERS OR PROMOTIONAL MATERIAL ON PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PROPERTY WITHOUT PERMISSION. It shall be unlawful for any person to erect, install, attach or paint, or cause to be erected, installed, attached or painted, election posters or signs upon public or private property, real or personal, in the state of Idaho, without permission from the owner or occupant of such property, and it shall be unlawful for any person to place or leave any literature or other political, promotional or sales materials upon public or private property, real or personal, in the state of Idaho when the owner or occupant of such property, by a sign conspicuously posted on the property, or by other written or audio communication to such person, has forbidden the placing or leaving of literature or other political, promotional or sales material upon that property. Provided, however, that the granting of such permission by any public utility company on behalf of any candidate for public office shall constitute the granting of like permission by such public utility company to all other candidates for the same public office. Any violation of this section shall be a misdemeanor. History:

TITLE 40 HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES CHAPTER 19

BEAUTIFICATION OF HIGHWAYS

40-1910. LOCATION OF DISPLAYS. No advertising display shall be placed or maintained in any of the following locations or positions or under any of the following conditions or if the advertising structure or sign is of the following nature:

- (1) Within the right-of-way of any highway;
- (2) Visible from any interstate or primary highway and simulating or imitating any directional, warning, danger or information sign permitted under the provisions of this chapter, or if intended or likely to be construed as giving warnings of traffic;
- (3) Within any stream or drainage canal or below the flood water level of any stream or drainage canal where the advertising display might be deluged by flood waters and swept under any highway structure crossing the stream or drainage canal or against the supports of the highway structure;
 - (4) Not maintained in a safe condition;
- (5) Visible from any interstate or primary highway and displaying any red, blue or blinking intermittent light likely to be mistaken for a warning or danger signal;
- (6) Illuminated with such brilliance and so positioned as to blind or dazzle the vision of travelers on adjacent interstate or primary highways;
 - (7) Purported to direct the movement of traffic;
- (8) Painted, affixed or attached to any natural feature as more particularly prohibited by section 18-7017, Idaho Code;
- (9) Hinder the clear, unobstructed view of approaching or merging traffic, nor obscure from view any traffic sign or other official sign;
- (10) Located as to obscure the view of any connecting highway or intersection; and
- (11) Not clear or in good repair. History:
