Plant: Houndstongue (Cynoglossum officinale)

Identification: Houndstongue is a biennial plant that reproduces by seed, growing 1-4 feet tall. It has hairy and rough leaves that are lance shaped. Houndstongue has reddish-purple flowers that are 5 lobed. The seeds are egg shaped, with hooked prickles that easily attach to clothing, fur, or feathers and can travel long distances, spreading this plant easily. The seeds are in a hard shell, making them viable in the soil around 4-7 years. Houndstongue generally is found in riparian habitats with a lot of moisture, near creeks, in wet grasslands, and open disturbed areas. It is a highly competitive plant that is toxic to livestock, attacking the liver and producing neurological effects.

Defense: Since this plant spreads by seed only, mechanical control can be effective, as long as you get a few inches of the root when you dig it up. Many herbicides work well on this plant as well, such as Escort XP and Telar XP. A biological control insect is in the final stages of being approved for release, to help slow the spread of this plant.
